

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

The Annual Meeting of the Parish Assembly will be held on Thursday 26th April at 7.30pm in Egglescliffe Community Centre on Durham Lane.



Your Councillors will report on the work of the Council during the past year and you will have the opportunity to ask questions and air your views on any topic which concerns you. COUNCIL TAX

A small part of the Council Tax collected by Stockton-on-Tees Borough Council from households in this civil parish goes to meet Egglescliffe & Eaglescliffe Council's demand ("precept"). Your local parish council receives nothing from business rates and, unlike the Borough Council and the police and fire services, nothing from central Government, apart from a fixed grant of £5446 passed on by Stockton Council.

Every year your local council considers carefully how much it will need to spend. This can vary according to whether big items are planned, as for many years it has been policy not to borrow money, so as to avoid burdening future council-taxpayers with debt and interest on it. It was hoped to fix the precept so that it would not cause a Council Tax increase. However, the Government announced that it would bring in legislation requiring parish councils to appoint a Data Protection Officer. S/he cannot be our Clerk, so, as the duties and cost of the new appointee were uncertain when the budget for the year ending 31st March 2019 had to be made, an estimated £5000 was provided for this. The effect is that a Band D council-taxpayer will pay for parish services £23.59 (about 45p per week), an increase of £1.07 (2p per week), for the whole year. Households in higher and lower bands will pay proportionately more or less. Since 2012-13 every year this has been less than it was for the four years before that. PLANNING UPDATE

Planning permission has now been given to Great North Air Ambulance for a helicopter base and a centre of excellence on part of the *Elementis* site at **Urlay Nook**.

The applicant has appealed against Stockton Council's non-determination of the application for 130 dwellings next to Hunter's Rest Farm, off **Urlay Nook Road**, to which your parish council objected. The decision will now be made by a Government-appointed Planning Inspector, but Stockton Council has indicated that it would have approved it.

Egglescliffe & Eaglescliffe Council objected to yet another application for a footbridge across the **River Tees** from Yarm School, together with conversion of farm land on the Egglescliffe bank to playing fields. Stockton Council turned this down, but it is reported that the School will appeal

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

A party of local residents and parish councillors is still working on this. They have also commented on Stockton Council's Draft Local Plan. This includes provision for car parking on the west side of Eaglescliffe Station, connected by a new footbridge over the railway. This would relieve traffic and parking on the east side and provide a route to that station and the Station Road businesses for residents of the *Kingsmead* estate etc. The working party supported this, but there is no immediate prospect of finding money for such work.

Reports on the amount of dog mess left in the Orchard Estate area by irresponsible owners were passed on to Stockton Councils enforcement team. Failure to clean up after your dog is an offence and authorised Council Officers can issue a £50 Fixed Penalty Notice to anyone that is seen to allow their dog to foul in a public place and not clean up after it.

FORMER EGGLESCLIFFE BRANCH LIBRARY

Stockton Council have sold the building and included in the sale the land to the south and west of the temporary fencing, without going through the statutory procedure for inviting public comments on the sale of public open space. At the time of writing there is a pending planning application to replace the building by a new one with shops and flats above, together with a small new car park on the west side, entered from Butterfield Drive. An objection to the loss of public open space due to the proposed new car park has been put in by Egglescliffe & Eaglescliffe Council. It has also queried whether the temporary fencing needs planning approval. It was erected about a year ago on behalf of the owner of the existing shopping parade, the car parks and most of the footpaths. He claims that the public and the owner of the former Library have no rights over his property.

A LONG-SERVING COUNCILLOR

In January 1993 Maureen Rigg was first elected to Egglescliffe Parish Council. She has served continuously as a councillor since then and has for many years chaired the very busy Recreation Committee. For many years until her retirement in 2015 she also represented you on Stockton Borough Council, who made her an Hon. Alderman.

To mark her 25 years' service, her fellow-councillors made a presentation to her, including an engraved pen. She has also been selected as a representative of parish councils in the Tees Valley at a Royal Garden Party at Buckingham Palace this summer.

EAGLESCLIFFE STATION TICKET OFFICE

It was with great regret that the parish council heard of the closure of the Eaglescliffe railway station ticket office. The office was modernised and re-opened in March 2012 and since then has been a hub of information for residents. The reason for closure we understand is due to the increasing use of the internet to buy tickets online and also the installation of two electronic ticket machines which are due on site in March. We would like to thank all the staff for their service to the community and wish them every success with future employment.

However, reports in the press say that talks are being held to try and keep the facility open in some form.



ORCHARD ESTATE

Since the October 2017 Newsletter was distributed, the parish council has been waiting for confirmation that the proposed information plaque for the Greenfield Drive entrance to Orchard Estate

could be mounted on the bus shelter there. We are pleased that the feature is now in place, giving a little historical information on the area which was originally part of Eaglescliffe Junction Farm including an orchard.

KINGSMEAD PLAY AREA

The parish council put £10,000 aside in 2017-18 and by adding to it from the 2018-19 budget we hope to be in a position later this year to begin looking at ideas to upgrade the older play equipment for young children
